

I also recall an exciting moment when our ship was readied for port, as the crew meticulously painted the bow in a striking shade of deep blue, signaling our impending return to Norfolk, Virginia, and crossing the Arctic Circle. This simple act was more than just aesthetic; it was a symbol of our pride and readiness to serve, encapsulating the spirit of camaraderie and duty that binds us as sailors.

Having had the opportunity to join the Auxiliary has given me more than I could ever repay. Why would one want to be part of such a special organization? The answer is clear.... Why wouldn't you? These are just a few of the many programs that are important to our members at American Legion Auxiliary.

Poppies: On Sept. 27, 1920, the poppy became the official flower of the American Legion Family, led largely by the American Legion Auxiliary, to memorialize the soldiers who fought and died during the war. In 1924, the distribution of poppies became a national program of The American Legion.

Pies for Hope: A local initiative by ALA Unit 164 in Katy, TX. An annual event where the community donates to provide Thanksgiving pies and financial assistance for the PTSD Foundation of America's Camp Hope. Who it supports: Combat veterans and their families suffering from PTSD. The PTSD Foundation of America, which runs Camp Hope in Houston. How it works: The program asks for sponsorships for Thanksgiving pies. Community members and businesses in Katy donate to support the campaign. The campaign provides not only pies but also financial contributions to help Camp Hope.

The goal: To bring hope and healing to veterans affected by PTSD. To help transform the lives of combat veterans and their families, enabling them to become thriving and productive members of society.

Wreaths Across America:

The Mission Remember: To commemorate the sacrifices of fallen U.S. veterans: Honor: To recognize the service of all those who have served in the U.S. military. **Teach:** To educate children and the public about the value of freedom.

The Role of the American Legion: Participation:

American Legion posts across the country are encouraged to join the national program by coordinating

local wreath-laying events.

Volunteers: Legion members and families often serve as volunteers to help place the wreaths on veterans' graves during ceremonies held nationwide. Commu**nity Events:** Legion posts participate in the broader Wreaths Across America movement, including escorts for the wreath-bearing trucks and directing volunteers at ceremonies. How It Works: Funding: Donations from individuals, corporate sponsors, and volunteer-led fundraising by groups like the American Legion Auxiliary help pay for the wreaths and transportation. Logistics: Wreaths are transported to over 4,000 locations across the U.S. and overseas for a coordinated wreath-laying ceremony on National Wreaths Across America Day. Ceremony: On that day, volunteers gather at cemeteries to place a wreath on each veteran's grave, often following an opening ceremony.

ALA Girls State: ALA Girls State, sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, is a hands-on citizenship training program for high school juniors designed to teach young women about American government and democratic processes through the creation of a fictional state government where they run for office and enact laws. The week-long program fosters leadership, promotes civic responsibility, and educates participants on their rights, privileges, and duties as citizen.

I would encourage all of our members to share what is so near and dear to our hearts. Share the stories of our Veterans, share the stories of the Auxiliary, share why we do what we do.

We have an exceptional Unit that was built by exceptional women that have come before us. These women continue to be leaders, mentors, friends and have lived the mission. We are grateful to you. Without you we wouldn't have a Unit.

Let's be proud of all of our accomplishments.

Chaplains are rightfully thought of as non-combatants. There role is to provide spiritual and morale support to the warrior, not wage the war itself. Surprisingly nine chaplains going back to the Civil War have received the Medal of Honor, our nation's highest award for valor. What follows is a brief introduction to those nine brave men of faith.

- 1. Father Emil Kapaun (U.S. Army, Korea) Captain Kapaun is widely credited as the most highly decorated chaplain in U.S. Military history. At the battle of Unsan, Captain Kapuan risked his life to provide medical care and comfort to his comrades. In the process he rescued numerous wounded fro enemy fire. Kapaun was declared venerable by Pope Francis in February of this year. He therefore is only two steps from becoming a saint in the Roman Catholic Church, with an additional confirmed miracle required for each. Several possible miracles attributed to him are currently under investigation by the Vatican.
- 2. Vincent Robert Capodanno (U.S. Navy, Vietnam) Lieutenant Capodano was a Navy Chaplain assigned to the 3d. Battalion, 5th Marines, 1st Marine Division (REIN) FMF. While rendering medical aid undee direct enemy fire. Chaplain Capodano was cut down by a burst of machine gun fire as he rushed to assist a mortally wounded corpsman.
- 3. Francis B. Hall (16th New York Infantry, Civil War) In May of 1863, Chaplain Hall carried wounded men to the rear allowing them to get much needed treatment for their wounds. He did so under what was described as the thickest of the fighting, and at great risk to his own life.
- 4. Milton Lorenzi Haney (Army, Civil War) Was incremental in the retaking of the "Federal Works." The Works had previously been taken by the enemy. Chaplain Haney was said to have carried a musket

within the ranks during the battle.

- 5. James Hill (21st Iowa Infantry, Civil War) His skillful and brave management was credited with the capture of three enemy pickets near Champion Hill Mississippi.
- 6. Charles James (Angelo) Liteky (U.S. Army, Vietnam) Operating within 15 meters of an enemy gun postion, Chaplain Liteky placed himself between the enemy guns and two wounded men. During a brief lull in the fighting he was able to drag the wounded men to a nearby landing zone. Before the battle near Phuoc-Lac was over Chaplain Liteky had carried over 20 wounded men to the same landing zone!
- 7. Joseph Timothy O'Callahan (U. S. Naval Reserve, World War II) O'Callahan was serving as Chaplain aboard the U.S.S. Franklin. The ship was attacked by enemy forces near Kobe, Japan. O'Callahan battled flames and twisted metal to not only minister to the wounded and dying, but at the same time organized and led fire fighting crews.
- 8. Charles Joespeh Watters (U.S. Army, Vietnam) Among other actions on November 19, 1967 Watters repeatedly subjected himself to enemy and friendly fire to retrieve wounded soldiers. Once all the wounded were accounted for he assisted the medics in their care. He was mortally wounded during his efforts that day on Hill 875 near Dak To.
- 9. John M. WhiteHead (5th Indiana Infantry, Civil War.) Transported several wounded soldiers to the rear during a heated battle in Stone River, Tennessee.

When things got heated these brave men of faith were not satisfied with "I'm sorry I'm a non-combatant." They took direct action to fill the very practical needs in front of them. In many cases they did so while seeing to their ministerial duties at the same time.

9/11 where was I?

With another Patriot Day having come and gone, I thought I would reflect on what it was like for me. I reentered the Air Force via the Texas Air National Guard in February 2001. So, I was already in uniform when this happened.

I was away at technical school for fighter aircraft maintenance, at Sheppard AFB, Wichita Falls, TX. I was sitting in a classroom, when my cell phone (in my pocket on silent) started blowing up. I figured it must be important, so I looked and there probably 5 or 6 texts from my wife saying, "are you seeing this"? I asked the instructor if the big screen tv in the room could get any news channels? He said yes and asked him to find one. Needless to say, what we saw was breath taking. Shortly after that a runner came to the classroom to tell me and one other national guard student that we needed to check in with home units. I went upstairs and my unit said they had me down on the roster and stay put and finish my course. When we were released for the day, as we stepped out of the hanger, we saw the flight line and ramp area quite literally packed with civilian airliners. There were buses and cargo trucks collecting passengers and luggage. Since Sheppard was at one time a bomber base, they some very long runways and became a diversion point for the many aircraft that were immediately grounded.

That evening base security began procedures to protect assets and personnel.

These included 100% ID Card checks, armed Humvees at all the gates, patrols along all the base perimeter fencing. We were not allowed to park any closer than 100 feet from any building including the dorms. They even suspended the formation marching that junior enlisted did going to and coming from class. Needless to say, it was an adjustment for some of us.

When I completed my training and returned to Ellington, I was immediately put on federal orders which lasted two years.

As a side note when President Bush left Florida headed to Offutt AFB in Nebraska, he was escorted by two fully armed F-16 fighter from the 147th Fighter Wing at Ellington. There is a photo hanging in the head-quarters building showing the president looking out of a window on Air Force One and there is one of our fighters off the wing tip.
