Because freedom rings!


Boot Camp by William Kennison (Adjutant)

Veteran Burial Benefits (Continued from Last Month Newsletter)

VA burial and memorial benefits

Veterans who die on active duty, or with discharges that are other than dishonorable, are entitled by law to:

- A gravesite in any national cemetery with available space, opening and closing of the grave.
- A government headstone, marker, urn, or medallion in a national and/or private cemetery.
- A government-issued U.S. flag to drape over the casket, and for presentation to the surviving spouse letter or next-of-kin.

A Presidential Memorial Certificate signed by the president of the United <u>States</u>. <u>Burial in a VA national cemetery</u>

Every eligible veteran who is entitled to burial in a national cemetery as long as space is available, and the following conditions are met:

- Veteran was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.
- Veteran was not subsequently convicted for offenses involving prohibited weapons of mass destruction, genocide and international terrorism.

With certain exceptions, service beginning after Sept. 7, 1980, as an enlisted person and service after Oct. 16, 1981, as an officer must have served for a minimum of 24 months or the full period for which the person was called to active duty. For a description of requirements go to www.cem.va.gov Burial benefits in a VA national cemetery include the following: gravesite, headstone, marker or medallion, opening and closing of the grave, and perpetual care of the grave site. Many national cemeteries have columbaria or gravesites for cremated remains. Gravesites in national cemeteries cannot be reserved. Many national cemeteries are closed to new casket interments. Funeral directors or others making burial arrangements must apply at the time of death.

Spouses and minor children of eligible veterans and of service members may also be buried in a national cemetery. If a surviving spouse of an eligible veteran marries a non-veteran, and remarriage was terminated by death or divorce of the non-veteran, the spouse is subsequently eligible for burial in a national cemetery.

My family roots in the military. By Morrow Krum (Commander)

My grandfather Morrow Krum



Born June 17, 1896

Married Caroline Kirkland Sanborn in September 1921

Son Morrow (Mike) Sanborn Krum (my dad and where the family names were merged, thus making me a Junior) born January 1933

Morrow was the Chicago Tribune's first aviation editor in 1921. He was also a Chicago advertising man. His obituary was printed in the *Chicago Daily Tribune*, Friday, May 7, 1943, page 7.

Morrow was killed in a military aircraft crash in Iceland, which claimed the lives of 13 other U.S. military and civilian personnel. Foul weather conditions contributed to the B-24D bomber slamming into Mount Fagradalsfjall, Iceland. The details of the crash are available at https://

www.findagrave.com/memorial/49242377/morrow-krum: "This distinguished crew and passengers were killed in an aircraft accident in a B-24 Liberator of the 8th Air Force (330th BS, 93rd Bomb Group) out of RAF Bovingdon, England, on Mt. Fagradalsfjall on the Reykjanes peninsula after an aborted attempt to land at the Royal Air Force station at Kaldadarnes, Iceland."

When World War Two began, Morrow was commissioned as a major in the U.S. army. At that time, he was employed with the advertising firm of Roche, Williams & Cunnyngham, Inc. of Chicago, where he had worked for 15 years as the director of public relations. As such he oversaw the publicity accounts for the Studebaker and Bendix Aviation corporations, which were in South Bend, Indiana. Prior to his death, Colonel Krum served as public relations officer for American forces in the European Theater.



This monument was erected at the crash site in Iceland. My Grandfather was a member of American Legion Post 214 in Lake Forest, IL. His brother, my uncle, whom I never knew was a Lt. Cmdr. in the USN. My grandfather, grandmother, uncle and father are all buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

So, as you can see I come from a rich history of military service.
