My father described it as “cussing a blue streak”. Certainly not Hollywood approved. After hearing my father’s story, I can’t watch Power’s movies without thinking he could use “military” language just like us.

We love this program and do all we can to support our girls going

to Texas Lutheran University in Seguin for a week in the summer to take part in Girls State. The impact that this week has on each girl goes way beyond simple schooling on how the government works. Some of the greatest benefits of Texas Bluebonnet Girls State are those gifts that come from forming new, life-long friendships, learning about civic responsibility, performing community service and becoming empowered young women. The empowerment that citizens gain comes through community, education and achieving goals through practicing our American Democratic process. It encourages leadership qualities that manifest themselves throughout a young woman’s career; it provides contact with girls from all walks of life; and it provides networking opportunities that will last into the future.

We contact each KISD high school before Christmas and encourage the counselors to nominate a list of girls who want to attend. During January and February we interview them all and rate them for the available scholarships. Each school provides one full scholarship and the Auxiliary provides one and sometimes two partial scholarships. We organize a District-wide Girls State Orientation Tea, which is attended by a Girls State Committee Member who provides information and guidance. Our District organizes buses that take the girls to Seguin and brings them back a week later. And we try to stay in touch with them for as long as we can as support and encouragement for their lives after high school. An amazing program from the American Legion Auxiliary!

Following 9/11 the federal government grouped critical infrastructure into 15 categories. Among these categories in recent years cybersecurity has been getting an increasing level of attention. This is because any technical infrastructure has been facing exponentially increasing risks from all sides !

One of the key agencies created to better protect cyber space and the rest of our critical infrastructure is the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA.) CISA is an independent agency operating under the Department of Homeland Security.

### Cyber Security—Continued

Through its website CISA makes available an enormous treasury of resources allowing end users of all sizes to better protect their cyber assets for free ! One of the best is the Known Exploited Vulnerabilities Catalog | CISA . Which can also be found at [www.cisa.gov/known-exploited-vulnerabilities-catalog](http://www.cisa.gov/known-exploited-vulnerabilities-catalog). The catalog is a comprehensive database of cyber vulnerabilities known by our federal government to have been exploited by cyber actors anywhere in the world. These are different than the “hacks” you often hear about. In fact it is in large part these vulnerabilities that make hacks to system possible.

Once a vulnerability is verified, a report is posted to the catalog. New vulnerabilities are listed as much as several times a day. This makes the catalog a very dynamic resource. The reports on each vulnerability are generally long and detailed. It is not unusual for them to run several pages. They not only outline specifically how each vulnerability occurred in what hardware or software, these reports outline specifically how the affected technical asset was compromised via the listed vulnerability. From there each report goes on to explain the mitigation steps that have been shown to defend against use of that vulnerability against a technical system. Systems can include something a simple as a single PC, or as complex as industrial control systems (ICS.) Examples of ICS usage includes everything from our power grid to water and sewer systems. So this one database empowers a level high level of protection for a lot of our daily world !

Civilian federal agencies are required to follow the mitigation steps outlined in the catalog's reports within a specified time. While CISA lacks the authority to make this requirement of private businesses, state and local governments and others, it makes this resource accessible to all. It also encourages everyone in the United States who depends on technology assets to make use of its information.

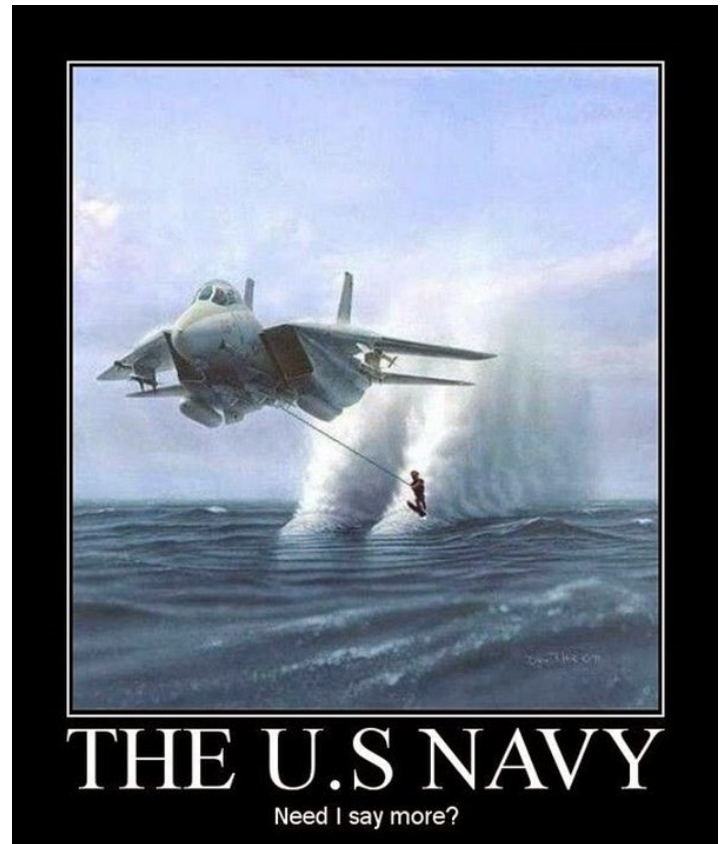


American Legion Rider Chapter 164

## Veteran Burial Benefits—Butch Sparks (Continued from the January Newsletter)

### Headstones and markers

VA provides headstones and markers anywhere in the world for the unmarked graves of veterans who died before Sept. 11, 2001. For the marked graves of veterans who died on or after Sept. 11, 2001, double marking is authorized. Flat bronze, flat granite, flat marble, upright granite and upright marble type are available to mark the grave in a style consistent with the cemetery. Niche markers are also available for urns.

When burial is in a national cemetery or state veterans cemetery, the headstone is ordered by the cemetery, which will place it on the grave. When burial occurs in a private cemetery, the headstone must be applied for from VA. The headstone is then shipped at government expense. VA does not pay the cost of placing the headstone on the grave. The cost is borne by the veteran's family or other party. These charges may be included in many prepaid funeral packages. VA Form 40-1330 (application for headstone) can be obtained from most funeral home directors, through veterans service officers, or through VA. This form may also be downloaded and printed out by visiting [www.cem.va.gov/hmm/](http://www.cem.va.gov/hmm/).

VA rules allow for custom inscriptions on headstones. Belief symbols such as Christian Crosses, Stars of David, Islamic Crescents and others are available. However, VA has limited other graphics such as logos, military decorations and fraternal organization marks. The best way to assure that you get the desired stone or plaque is by obtaining and filling out VA Form 40-1330 (Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker for Installation in a Private or State Veterans Cemetery) and filing it with other documents. When a spouse or child is buried in the same grave as a veteran, VA will have a contractor inscribe the reverse side of the headstone. Twenty-year reservists are eligible for a headstone or marker.

Specific steps must be taken for authorization from The American Legion to affix an American Legion emblem onto the headstone.

### Burial flags

A U.S. flag is provided, at no cost, to drape over the casket or accompany the urn of a deceased veteran who served honorably in the U. S. Armed Forces. It is furnished to honor the memory of a veteran's military service.

Eligibility for former members of Selected Reserves was added by Section 517 of Public Law 105-261.

The flag will be issued once only for burial purposes and will not be replaced if lost, stolen, damaged or destroyed. National cemeteries with avenues of flags, and many state veterans cemeteries, accept donations of burial flags for mass display on Memorial Day, Veterans Day and other occasions. The standard issue burial flag is made of cotton and will not withstand continuous outdoor display. Burial flags may be obtained at VA regional offices, national cemeteries and most local post offices. Overseas, U.S. flags can be obtained from U.S. embassies or consulates. VA will furnish a burial flag for veterans who served during wartime, died on active duty after May 27, 1941, who served after Jan. 31, 1955, peacetime veterans who were discharged or released before June 27, 1950, certain people who served in the organized military forces of the commonwealth of the Philippines while in service of the U.S. Armed Forces, and who died on or after April 25, 1951, and certain former members of the Selected Reserves.

### Burial and plot-interment allowance

You may be eligible for a VA burial allowance if all these conditions are met:

- You paid for a veteran's burial or funeral.
- You have not been reimbursed by another government agency or some other source, such as the deceased veteran's employer.
- The veteran was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.
- In addition, at least one of the following conditions must be met. The veteran:

- o Died because of a service-related disability.
- o Was receiving VA pension or compensation at the time of death.
- o Was entitled to receive VA pension or compensation, but decided not to reduce his/her military retirement or disability pay.
- o Died while hospitalized by VA, or while receiving care under VA contract at a non-VA facility.
- o Died while traveling under proper authorization and at VA expense to or from a specified place for the purpose of examination, treatment, or care.
- o Had an original or reopened claim pending at the time of death and has been found entitled to compensation or pension from a date prior to the date of death.

Died on or after Oct. 9, 1996, while a patient at a VA-approved state nursing home.

### How much does VA pay?

For a veteran's service-related death: If the death was due to his or her service-connected disability, VA will pay up to \$2,000 toward burial expenses occurring on or after Sept. 11, 2001.

For a veteran's non-service-related death since Oct. 1, 2011: If the death occurred while hospitalized by VA, it will pay up to \$700 toward burial and funeral expenses.

If a veteran's death was not due to a service-connected disability and the veteran was not hospitalized by VA, the veteran must meet at least one specific condition to receive up to \$300 toward burial and funeral expenses and a \$300 plot-interment allowance.

## American Legion Protocol by Butch Sparks (Judge Advocate)

1. Three raps of the gavel are a signal to rise (at attention), and one rap of the gavel signals that members should be seated.

2. When the American Legion cap is placed down on any surface, the Legion emblem must be facing up.

3. Any decorations or insignia attached to the Legion cap must be done so ONLY on the right side.

4. While wearing the American Legion cap, salutes should be made as if in the military uniform.

5. When not wearing the official Legion cap, Honors to the Colors or any other requirement to salute MAY now be done by saluting as if in the military uniform because a 2008 change to the U.S. Flag Code provides this option.

6. During prayers, moments of silence and the Pledge of Allegiance, headgear will be removed and held over the heart with the right hand. The Legion cap will be held with the hand in the cap and the emblem facing out.

7. No one will be admitted to the meeting room during opening, initiation, or closing ceremonies of an American Legion meeting.

8. Members cannot leave the meeting during any prayers, periods of silence, or the obligation.

9. When entering or leaving the meeting room after the meeting has started, members must go to the center of the room, salute the Colors, and then be seated or depart the room.

10. Any person approaching the podium during a meeting must enter by the side of the National Colors and depart by the side of the Organizational Colors, rendering the hand salute to the National Colors when both approaching and departing.

11. Guests or visitors should be escorted to the podium by the Sergeant At Arms.

12. Nobody is allowed to come between the Commander's station and the Colors.

## Protocol Continued

13. Nobody is permitted to "Break The Colors" (enter the space between the National Colors and Post Colors), such as handing something to the Commander or anyone on the dais.

14. All Legion Family members will carry spare Legion Family applications for recruiting purposes.

15. Cell phones must not ring during any meetings. Cut them off or place them in vibrate mode.

16. The Legion cap is the only cover recommended for wear at our General Membership meeting.

17. Do not eat while wearing your cap.
