The Right to Bear Arms By Deb Watson (Post 164 2nd Vice Commander)

Let me start by saying, I believe in being armed to protect my family, my country, and my property. Being armed, carrying a weapon has become common place in Texas. Many Veterans feel safer knowing that there is a gun in their vehicle, or a gun on their person. At our house, we have a closet dedicated to weapons. I call it the "Free State of Arnold."

When we were planning our trip to the Smoky Mountains, Larry was the one who said, "We are traveling through eight states and we need to know their gun laws". He registered for a concealed carry license and renewed his gun carry insurance.

I never really thought much about using a weapon for protection, until Larry and I were returning from our vacation trip. We had stopped in Bolivar, Tennessee to eat dinner. Bolivar is in Hardeman County, next town past Selmar, home of "Walking Tall" Sheriff Buford Pusser. While we were waiting for our dinner to be served, I had an uneasy feeling. I asked Larry to check the truck, to make sure it was ok. He came back in the restaurant and said, "It's fine." I still felt uneasy. When dinner was over, I walked around the truck, checking the tires. The left front tire had 4 ten penny nails in the tire in a row. The right front tire had 2 nails. I looked at Larry and said, "We have to get out of here before these tires deflate. This is intentional and they have a plan for us." I drove west on a very dark two lane road, heading to I-40. We had just left the city limits of Bolivar, when a car was following us and flashing it's lights. I said to Larry, " Don't be scared, but we are being followed and they want us to pull over. Get your Betsy out of the glove compartment, take her out of the case, and put her right beside me so I can reach her. If these tires go flat and I have to pull over, we are not going to be robbed, car-jacked, or murdered without shots being fired." I was never so prepared to defend us as I was at that mom-

ment.

I kept on driving until I reached I-40 and pulled into a well lit service station. I called Road Assistance and they arrived in 15 minutes, changed out the one tire and repaired the other. We got back on I-40 and headed to Arkansas where we spent the night and felt safe. Next morning, we were on our way home to Texas.

It is my belief that many military members and also non-military individuals are in the dark about the Auxiliary. The Auxiliary is a vital part of the American Legion. We as Auxiliary members support our Unit and Post in many ways.

Some of the ways include:

Wreaths Across America, Poppies, Pies for Hope, Turkey Dinners for Veterans and their families, Girls State, Breakfast with Veterans, Backpacks for school children in need, Fish Fry, etc. In raising funds, through various organizations, raising donations in the community. This allows us to help our Veterans' and our communities.

The ALA has significant scholarship opportunities for Veterans and their families.

Educational Scholarships

For 2026, ALA National offers several significant scholarship opportunities for members and their families:

Member Loyalty Scholarship: ALA National awards ten \$2,500 gift scholarships to current college students who have been ALA members for at least three years.

Children of Warriors Scholarship: ALA National offers fifteen \$5,000 scholarships for children of veterans to pursue higher education.

Non-Traditional Student Scholarship: A \$2,000 award from ALA National for members or veterans returning to school later in life or after an educational interruption.

Community and Fellowship

Ready-Made Support System: Joining a local unit provides a network of peers who share similar values and a dedication to the military community.

Auxiliary Emergency Fund (AEF): Members who have maintained membership for at least three consecutive years are eligible for national grants of up to \$3,000 to help during financial setbacks caused by natural disasters or personal crises.

The American Legion strongly supports the latest effort to eliminate the unjust offset that penalizes thousands of combat-injured veterans.

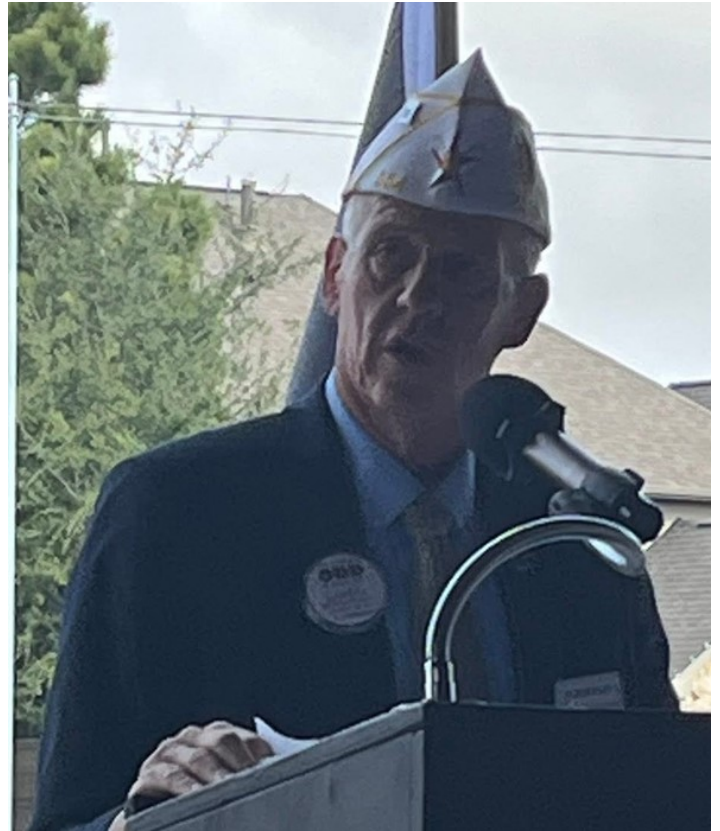
This long-overdue reform—backed by The American Legion and more than 60 other military and veteran organizations—would ensure that combat-injured retirees can receive both their Department of Defense retirement pay and the disability compensation earned through their sacrifices. Current law reduces retirement pay by the exact amount of VA disability compensation received, a policy that punishes wounded veterans for their service and injury. We call this what it is: a “wounded veteran tax,” and it must end.

The standalone bill has overwhelming bipartisan support, with 313 cosponsors in the House and 77 in the Senate as of January 2026—more than enough to pass if brought to a floor vote.

The American Legion urges Congress to do right by our nation’s combat-wounded heroes and pass this amendment without delay. These veterans have already paid more than their fair share.

WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA

On December 13th, 2025 The American Legion Post 164 Family conducted the annual wreath laying ceremony at Magnolia Cemetery in Katy. Many area VIPs were in attendance including State Representatives Mike Schofield and Matt Morgan; and Mayor of Katy, Dusty Theil. The keynote speaker was American Legion Department Commander Rich Huntley. The Sea Cadets presented the colors and the combined Honor Guard from American Legion Post 164 and VFW Post 9182 conducted the rifle salute with Steve Walker from Bugles Across America presenting taps. American Legion Post 164 also recognized our oldest member 101-year-old WWII Veteran Aaron Mendoza. The community was out in force and 575 wreaths were placed.



Recent executive order removes barrier to research that could alleviate mental health issues and reduce veteran suicide rate, National Commander Wiley writes.

Dear American Legion Family members and friends,

Sometimes we measure our advocacy successes in months, or even sessions of Congress. In the case of the recent reclassification of cannabis, it took nearly a decade.

On Dec. 18, I was honored to participate in an Oval Office ceremony where President Trump signed an executive order directing federal agencies to remove outdated barriers to federally approved research into the therapeutic value of cannabis for veterans. The American Legion has called for reclassification of cannabis to recognize it “as a drug with potential medical value” as early as 2016 when it approved a resolution.

Here’s what the executive order means: It lifts the restrictions on large-scale, randomized clinical trials that could lead to solutions for veterans, first responders and others who are facing challenges with PTSD, TBI, sleep disruption, anxiety, depression and chronic pain.

I am so pleased that this obstacle has been set aside. Advances in cannabis research have the potential to lead to solutions that could alleviate these issues, and contribute to reducing suicide risk among veterans. If just one clinical trial yields a solution that can save the life of just one veteran, it will be worth it.

Just think what that will mean to The American Legion’s efforts to prevent suicide as part of our Be the One mission.

As we celebrate this achievement, let’s also be clear about one thing: The American Legion’s support for this executive order does not imply we support the legalization of cannabis for non-medical use. Reclassification does not mean legalization for recreational use, nor does it mandate use of potential clinical options. It simply removes outdated federal barriers to critical research.

Through years of engagement with veterans and clinicians, we have learned how cannabis can be life changing for some individuals. With the signing of this executive order, science-backed solutions can be reached and more veterans’ lives could be saved.
